Congratulations on your membership in Skidmore's Honors Forum and welcome to the unique academic, leadership, and community service opportunities the Forum makes available to you. Our hope is that you will find this *Member's Guide* helpful in answering questions you have about your continuing membership in the Forum: people and offices to contact, membership responsibilities and requirements, annual events, and information that we hope you will find useful in making the most of your years in the Forum. What is the Honors Forum?

Honors Forum's Mission

The central goal of the Honors Forum is to strengthen the intellectual community for all highly motivated Skidmore students, and especially to encourage the academic aspirations of exceptionally talented first-year and second-year students. The "Forum," as the name suggests, is intended not as an exclusive society but rather as a structure for organizing and promoting our common interests as an academic community. Thus, while formal membership in the program involves around 300 students selected for their academic commitments and accomplishments in the various disciplines, most of the honors-designated courses and co-curricular activities sponsored by the Forum invite the participation of other highly motivated Skidmore students as well.

That's the official mission statement. In less official language, we like to say, "HF membership helps you add 'more' to your Skidmore education." The Forum is a structure for organizing and promoting the common interests of Skidmore as an academic community by offering enhanced courses and independent studies as well as opportunities for campus leadership and community service. The students invited to become members of the Honors Forum serve as a leadership core for the larger student community.

Honors Forum membership is not something you can just frame and hang on your wall. It is a community in which you must be an active and pro-active member. The Honors Forum is designed to provide extra support for its members' academic interests and goals. Its purpose is to help you obtain support (often financial) for academic projects, for example, designing your own independent studies, organizing and participating in events and activities, accessing school resources, and taking full ownership of your education.

History

The idea for an honors program at Skidmore College was not new. It had been considered in the 1920s, 1970s, and the 1980s, but the decision to finally establish an honors program in the 1990s was a response to two pressing needs of Skidmore's best students:

- 1) to further challenge this special population, especially early in their freshman and sophomore years, and
- 2) to establish a social network for students who are especially academically motivated.

The Honors Forum was the brainchild of former Dean of Studies Jon Ramsey, who with a faculty/student/administration task force, created a proposal for an organization designed to support Skidmore's top students in their academic and co-curricular endeavors. The proposal was accepted.

The Forum's designers developed a program to enrich the academic lives of *all* Skidmore students. Honors classes are open to any student prepared for the academic challenges; likewise, Honors Forum events are almost always open to the entire student body.

The Honors Forum inducted its first twenty-eight members in the spring of 1997 and offered its first courses in September 1998. The Skidmore Class of 2001 included the first graduating class of fourteen Honors Forum members.

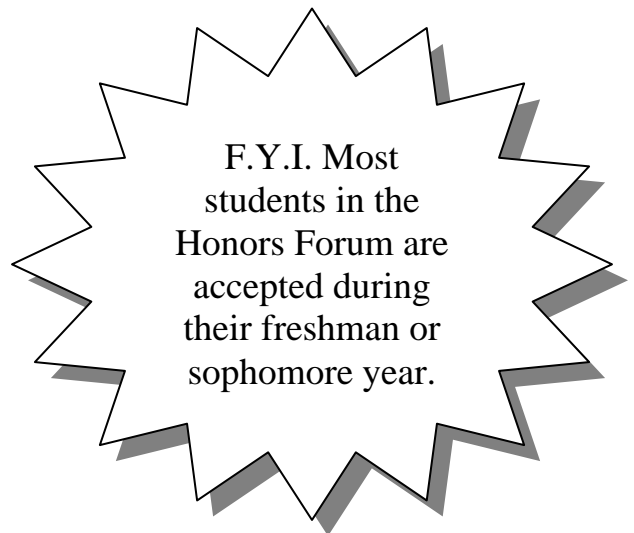
How did I get here?

The Selection Process

The Office of Admissions invites incoming first-year students to join the Forum based on their high school academic records, recommendations, participation in extracurricular, community, and leadership activities, and personal accomplishments. These students begin their Honors experience by taking HF101: First-Year Honors Colloquium in their first semester.

Once at Skidmore there are two more opportunities to join the Forum. After the first semester of your freshman year, if you have attained a 3.40 GPA or above, you will be eligible to apply to the Forum. The application form is available on the Honors Forum website under **Students** and in hardcopy in the Honors Forum office.

Didn't hit the mark your first semester? Don't worry. The same process applies after the first semester of your sophomore year. To determine acceptance, a student's application is reviewed by a team of at least one faculty member and one Honors Forum student, who consider the applicant's personal statement, academic record, and faculty recommendations in making their decision on a student's acceptance into the Forum. For 2005-2006, new membership will be limited to approximately 10% of the incoming class.



Re-application Procedure and Form

To achieve its mission within the Skidmore community, Honors Forum requires its members to remain active. Therefore, beginning in 2005-2006, once students have been accepted into the Honors Forum, they are not guaranteed membership for the rest of their time at Skidmore. Members need to complete and submit a re-application form for continuing membership in the Forum. At the end of each academic year, you will receive an email with a link to the re-application form. It will ask you to detail your involvement with the Forum over the past year.

This process helps us retain members who are serious about their commitment to the Honors Forum. It also helps members of the Honors Council and Student Executive Committee assess the aspects of the Forum the members enjoyed and found useful over the year. Members of the Council and Student Executive Committee will read re-application forms over the summer; members will receive notification that their reapplication obligation has been met. Members not completing the re-application form will be asked whether they wish to continue in the Forum and may be asked to relinquish their membership.

What do I have to do now?

HF 101: First-Year Honors Colloquium

HF101 is a fall semester, one-hour, theme-centered introductory course designed for incoming, first-year Honors Forum members. In addition to its academic component, the course includes activities intended to build community among students entering Skidmore as Forum members. It is offered only on an S/U basis. Course themes change, but the format consistently includes faculty guest speakers and evening activities. Upon completing HF 101, students receive one credit toward their degree. Because HF 101 is not open to students other than those entering as Honors Forum members, the class does not count toward the three course or seven-hour graduation requirement.

Continuation Requirements


Membership in the Honors Forum signifies a special commitment to the Skidmore community. To demonstrate that commitment, members must abide by these requirements:

- a. Maintain a 3.40 GPA or higher. Students must have a minimum 3.40 cum GPA to graduate as a member of the Honors Forum.
- b. Take either 3 honors classes/experiences (including independent study or study abroad) or 7 honors credits (whichever comes first, excluding HF 101)
If you were inducted freshman year, you must complete these requirements by the end of your junior year.
If you were inducted as a sophomore, you have until the end of your senior year to complete requirements.
- c. Complete an honors capstone project during senior year. A capstone is the course or courses a student's major requires/offers as a **departmental** capstone (thesis, senior project, senior research seminar, senior art show, recital, independent study, etc.)
- d. Beginning with the Class of 2009, perform an approved Community Service experience prior to graduation
- e. Participate actively in planning, coordinating, presenting Honors Forum events
- f. Maintain social and academic integrity
- g. Complete an annual re-application form

Note: Though Honors Forum is not officially a college minor, you'll find Honors Forum requirements are tracked and designated on degree status forms as a minor for administrative purposes.

Ways to Get Credit

classes Honors classes are open to the entire Skidmore Community, but remember either seven honors credits or three honors class experiences are graduation requirements for Honors Forum members. These classes are designed to be intellectually rigorous and engaging. Honors classes can be found in many disciplines; however, we are always hoping to offer more courses.



Honors Forum members can **pre-register** for honors classes on the Honors Forum website to ensure their enrollment! You will be e-mailed the list of honors classes prior to pre-registration for the upcoming semester, and a list of honors courses will be available at the web site

Have you taken or do you know of a class that you think deserves honors credit? If you think a course or department would be a good addition to our honors offerings, talk to the professor and the Honors Forum Director. The Honors Council assists faculty in designing new honors courses or revamping existing courses to achieve honors designation. Suggest to the professor that he or she may wish to propose it to Honors Council. Instructors receive a stipend for each new honors level class they create and teach, so there's also a modest financial incentive for course development!

one-credit-hour course add-ons Can't find an honors class that interests you? One credit add-ons are a great way to add intellectual challenge to an existing course. Some courses (English, History, and Art History, among others) have scheduled HF add-ons to the parent course. Students can choose to take the one-hour add-on in addition to the regular course.

A second way to take an add-on is to develop an independent or group independent study attached to a scheduled course. These are usually extended studies of material covered in the course that the student/s and professor would like to study in more detail. Proposing an add-on is the same as proposing an independent study; remember you will need to work with your sponsoring professor to develop one and submit the proposal form, available at the Honors Forum web site: http://www.skidmore.edu/academics/hfc/curriculum/independent_study/independent_study.htm.

Helpful Hints:

A good time to develop an independent study add-on attached to a scheduled course is after you have completed registering for your semester courses and have an idea what material the course will cover. Some students and faculty also work up add-ons during the drop-add period (the first week of classes each term). Honors Add-Ons are listed in the Master Schedule under “Honors.”

debate society The Skidmore Debate Society began in fall 2004 when Honors Forum student Matthew Cronin '06 took the initiative to propose the idea to Honors Council. Currently the Debate Society participates in parliamentary style debate tournaments against teams from such colleges as Bates, Boston University, Colby, Harvard, Hobart-William Smith, Mt. Holyoke, and Vassar. Debates range over serious national, international, and ethical topics as well as comedic topics, such as Skidmore's “signature” debate, “Should Batman kill Joker?”

In 2004-2005, Debate Society members traveled to a number of intercollegiate debates and won several awards. Students also enrolled in a one-credit independent study in which they studied rhetoric and prepared for debates.

independent studies (1-4 honors credits) When it comes to honors independent studies, you have two options: HF271/272 for freshmen and sophomores or HF371/372 for juniors and seniors. These classes are designed to allow flexibility in the education of Honors Forum members who choose to pursue projects, research, or advanced studies in areas of particular interest.

The Process:

- 1) Find a faculty sponsor who will oversee your study.
- 2) Write a proposal, detailing what you will be doing and when during the semester in your independent study, explaining why the independent study deserves honors credit, and noting why the available honors courses are not suitable for your goals.
- 3) Submit this proposal to the Honors Council for approval.

What have other students done?

D-Hall (Dining Hall) Revolution—Environmental advocates **Michael Kramer '06, Jonathan Greene '07, and Emily Mastellone-Snyder '06** studied ways to bring more locally grown food to Skidmore Food Services and the dining halls. In their group independent project, they compiled a comprehensive database of local farms and assessed their ability to provide food year-round.

Bilingual Education—**Stacy Aguirre '05** studied bilingual programs in American high schools to determine the most effective way to teach students to speak English without losing their first language.

F.Y.I. Honors independent studies may be repeated with a different topic for credit; however, **only a total of three credits** will be counted toward the Honors Forum three course/seven credit requirement.

study abroad programs and portfolio (1-4 honors credits) You can find a list of recommended and approved programs for Honors credit at the Office of International Programs and the Honors Forum Office. In order to receive credit for a recommended or not pre-approved study abroad program, you must first find a faculty sponsor and then meet with the Honors Forum Director prior to beginning the program to develop a plan for your portfolio.

With some international programs it is difficult to plan too far ahead. Many students get their portfolio plans underway when they arrive at their study abroad location and discuss portfolio plans with the Honors Forum Director over e-mail. Upon your return from studying abroad, submit the portfolio as an independent study project to the Honors Forum Director. Students typically receive one-three Honors credits for their portfolios.

What have other students done?

Allison Feigen '07 went on the Education Department's May-June 2005 trip to South Africa and received honors credit by compiling a portfolio, presenting her experience to her former high school, and submitting her completed project portfolio to the Honors Forum Director.

Caitlin Woolsey '07 completed an internship in spring 2005 with Greenpeace Austria.

Course Evaluations and Assessments

Honors courses have special assessment forms in addition to the college's course and instructor assessments. You will receive these to fill out at the conclusion of a course. These assessments are treated confidentially. After your instructor reads them, they are stored in the Honors Forum Office. Course and instructor evaluations are part of Honors Forum's assessment project, and they are often most useful in course planning. Each year you will also be expected to offer your own self-assessments of your Skidmore experience, especially as it pertains to your membership in Honors Forum.

Community Service

Since its inception, Honors Forum has emphasized the importance of its members being actively involved in community service and leadership activities both on campus and in the Saratoga Springs-area community. Various college offices (Admissions, First-Year Experience, Dean of Studies, Alumni Affairs) seek Honors Forum members to volunteer as panelists and speakers for college events. Beginning with the Class of 2009 inductees, one-semester of student-selected community service/leadership activity will become a graduation requirement.

During the term you select to complete the community service requirement, you will be asked to submit a brief report of your experience to receive credit for its completion. There are many on-campus and off-campus options for fulfilling this requirement. Some of these are listed below. Anita Steigerwald, Honors Forum's Coordinator of Co-Curricular, Community Service and Leadership Activities in Case Center 310 (x5779, asteiger@skidmore.edu), will assist you with your community service requirement.

Off-Campus Opportunities

saratoga springs connection HF200 and HF201, the Junior Great Books Training and Practicum classes, most recently taught by Prof. Catherine Golden of the English Department, offer great ways for you to get involved in the Saratoga-area community and to complete your community service requirement. In HF200, a fall semester, one-credit hour course, you will be trained in and receive certification as a Junior Great Books instructor, in a literature-based curriculum used in schools from kindergarten through twelfth grade. As a certified Junior Great Books instructor, you will learn how to develop literature units which encourage a love of reading in your students.

After completing HF200 in the fall semester, you will be expected to take HF201 Junior Great Books Practicum in the spring semester. This is a two-credit hour course in which you put what you learned in HF200 into practice at the Schuylerville, NY middle school, where you will help conduct a ten-week, after-school literacy program under the supervision of a trained professor.

the saratoga ymca Last year several Honors Forum members began volunteering as tutors and mentors for pre-teens and teens at the Saratoga YMCA. We plan to continue offering this opportunity for very rewarding and enjoyable community service again this year. Watch for ways to become involved.

On-Campus Opportunities

the writing center (ladd 320) Ever had a paper that you knew needed lots of help but couldn't figure out what to do with it? The Writing Center is a wonderful resource on campus. Located on the third floor of Ladd Hall, The Writing center is staffed by students who are prepared to provide help with writing assignments in any stage in their completion – or lack thereof. You can bring the writing tutors a page of notes, an outline, or an entire rough draft, and they are there to help you “kick it up a notch.”

The center is staffed entirely by students. Want to become a writing tutor? You must be a sophomore, junior, or senior and complete EN303H: Peer Tutoring, a course designed to train you in the fine art of tutoring writing. Enrollment in the course requires a writing sample and recommendation from a professor. Peer tutoring at the writing center is an excellent form of community service.

peer tutoring in other disciplines Faculty members recommend students who have demonstrated outstanding knowledge in courses to become peer tutors. Peer tutors are available for course work in all disciplines. Many Honor Forum students excel in their course work and are asked to become peer tutors. The Office of the Dean of Studies in Starbuck Center coordinates peer tutoring. Peer tutoring is another excellent form of community service.

Have Your Own Community Service Idea?

So you have your own idea for an event or activity—fabulous! The Honors Forum thrives on its members' leadership, creativity, and pro-activity, but now what? Actually, proposing and leading programs in conjunction with the Honors Forum is easy.

Step 1- If you think of a way to connect Skidmore with the outside community that will be challenging, rewarding, and fun, propose a community connection. Submit your idea by going to the Honors Forum website, clicking on **Students**, and filling out the **Events/Activities Proposal Form**.

They will be your liaisons with the administration and will have the knowledge and contact information to discuss your idea and help you develop it.

What have other students done?

Adam Epstein '08 organized a free public showing of *What the #\$*! do We Know?* for the Skidmore Community at the Saratoga Film Forum. He also moderated a panel discussion with Skidmore faculty and community professionals. It was a huge success!

E-Portfolio

The electronic portfolio is a new assessment project that Skidmore College is providing for its students. The Honors Forum is taking part in the ongoing process of incorporating e-portfolios into the college curriculum through the inclusion of honors- level work and personal reflections on membership in the Forum. Last year HF first-year students and seniors piloted the e-portfolio; plans are for all members to use the e-portfolio to keep track of their Skidmore experience. More details about the e-portfolio will be made available over the course of this year.

Senior Capstone

Each graduating Honors Forum member must complete a culminating capstone project in his/her senior year. Most of the time, the Honors capstone is a student's senior major requirement, such as a thesis, research report, performance, exhibit, etc. Sometimes, a student's capstone is completed by a 300-level course taken during the senior year, and in other cases it is an independent project. Honors Forum members are required to present their senior capstone projects publicly. This may be done as part of the senior departmental presentations, a show, a performance, a recital, or, most typically, at Academic Festival.

What have other students done?

Business major **Steven Yaeger '05** completed his senior capstone by studying the relationship between corruption and foreign direct investment inflows and then sharing his findings in an Academic Festival presentation called, "Is Being Bad Good?"

In order for a project to count toward the Honors Forum capstone requirement, it must be approved by the Director. To propose a project, you can simply fill out the **Proposal for Senior Capstone Requirement** form under "students" on the website: <http://www.skidmore.edu/academics/hfc/forms/capstoneform.html>.

HF 301: Senior Symposium (1 honors credit)

Each spring semester, HF 301: Senior Honors Symposium is offered. The course is not a requirement for graduation in the Forum. However, many seniors have found the class provides an intellectually stimulating conclusion to their Skidmore education. The format and topic vary by instructor, but the central goal is to have seniors meet weekly in seminar setting to discuss the principles of their disciplines and to share with classmates the work they have been doing on their senior capstone projects.

What about the fun stuff?

Annual Honors Forum Events

The Honors Forum is well known for its annual events. In addition to Academic Festival and Shades of Gray, which are detailed below, the Honors Forum organizes the annual **Jon A. Ramsey Honors Forum Lecture**, named for a professor of English who served as Dean of Studies for twenty-three years and who was one of the founders of the Honors Forum. Past lecturers, chosen by Honors Council and the Dean of Faculty, have been Professor Tom Lewis, English; Professor Mary Lynn, American Studies; Professor Mason Stokes, English; Professor Mary Crone Odekon, Physics; Professor Michael Arnush, Classics; and in 2005, Professor Steven Frey, Chemistry.

The Forum also coordinates Induction Ceremonies for its new members in September and February. In April, the Forum hosts Accepted Candidates Luncheons and arranges overnight visits for accepted candidates invited to join the Honors Forum. Honors Forum's academic year events conclude with the Senior Week Reception for graduating seniors and their parents, who listen to brief speeches, enjoy refreshments and entertainment, and receive their Honors Forum medallion, which they wear at commencement.

academic festival Academic Festival is an opportunity for students to share their academic achievements with the entire Skidmore Community. It is held the day after spring semester classes end. Student presentations have included research and papers, student-created films, dances, music performances, PowerPoint presentations, panel discussions, art exhibits, slide shows, etc. This event is a great opportunity to explore disciplines you aren't familiar with and to appreciate your fellow students' achievements over the past year.

All students, not just Honors Forum members, are invited to apply to showcase their work. Applications are on the Honors Forum website under Student Forms.

shades of gray This annual, multi-day, interactive panel discussion provides a setting for the Skidmore community to explore a topic occupying the “gray” areas of our lives. A controversial topic, a diverse group of panelists, provocative discussion questions, and sometimes mixed media presentations are featured in these events.

Past Shades of Gray Topics:

2005- Race and Racism on Skidmore’s Campus Skidmore students discussed race-related issues that surface in the classroom and in our co-curricular lives.

2004- Sex, Lies and Stereotypes: Gender at Skidmore Included a student-made documentary on the infamous and now-prohibited Diva Night.

2003-Skidmore’s Identity Crisis Students and faculty discussed the favorable and unfavorable aspects of what gives Skidmore its identity.


2002- Do we live in an ethical culture? This program included discussion of everything from Art and Literature to Enron to the (then) anticipated war on Iraq. The program also included a viewing of several popular TV sitcoms.

Want to get involved or suggest a topic? To propose a Shades of Gray topic or volunteer for The Shades of Gray Planning Subcommittee of the Student Executive Committee, which is comprised of Honors Forum members, invited campus “experts” on the topic, and volunteers, see Matthew Cronin ‘06 Annual Events Coordinator or the Honors Forum Director.

Other Honors Forum Events

all-forum meeting Each semester the Honors Forum holds an all-Forum meeting to update the members on what Honors Council and Student Executive Committee have been discussing. This meeting will include reports on and discussion of recent events, changes in policy, and any new business. It is also a chance to meet other Forum members and chat over refreshments.

fellowships and scholarships info session Every spring a representative from the Office of the Dean of Studies gives a brief presentation about a number of prestigious, highly competitive, high-paying fellowships and scholarships available to students (e.g. Rhodes, Fulbright, Woodrow Wilson, Truman, Goldwater, Marshall, Kent-Cooke, among others). Most pertain to graduate study in the U.S. or abroad, and most of these high-end fellowship and scholarship applications must be completed very early in the senior year. They also require considerable preparation beforehand.



Freshmen and sophomores: it's not too early to think about graduate school, especially if you want to pursue one of these prestigious fellowships or scholarships!

Trips

The Honors Forum has traditionally sponsored one trip per semester. The Honors Council and the Student Executive Committee usually organize these excursions, but anyone is invited to suggest trip ideas. Past excursions have included the New York Metropolitan Opera, Massachusetts Museum of Modern Art, Massachusetts Museum of Contemporary Art, Norman Rockwell Museum, Cooperstown, NY (Farmer's Museum, Fenimore House, and Baseball Hall of Fame).

Fridays @ 4 (New!)

New for 2005-2006 are the Honors Forum Fridays @ 4 food and discussion sessions. Once a month (see calendar for dates) Honors Forum members will gather for a themed discussion with faculty members or upper-class students to discuss a timely issue in the news or on campus. Fridays @ 4:00 are a great place to meet other Forum members, munch on snacks, and talk about topics that engage our interest. Student Executive Committee considers Fridays @ 4:00 an exciting way to emphasize the Forum's vital role (discussion among peers) in our organization's title! Please let us know if you have an idea for a Friday @ 4:00 topic and suggestions for guest speaker/s.


Honors Floors

The mission of the Honors Floors: To create a living environment in which residents can share their intellectual enthusiasm and embrace the community of honors students in their daily lives.

hathorn house located on the second floor of Weiking Hall, is also a mostly quiet and clean residence, and accommodates 48 people in corridor-style housing.

It takes its name from a building on Skidmore's old campus that was used as both academic and social recreation space.

Recently, members of Hathorn House have used their \$1,000 budget to make Japanese tea bowls and take a trip to see *Motorcycle Diaries*. In the past Hathorn residents have hosted a murder mystery dinner party, performed a play written by a member of the floor, and organized a historical/architectural tour of Skidmore's original campus in downtown Saratoga Springs.



Contrary to popular belief, the Honors Floors are not directly affiliated with the Honors Forum. Anyone with a minimum GPA of 3.4 can apply to live on one of the two Honors Floors, provided s/he agrees to actively support the mission of the floors.

adams house is located on the second and third floors of Wait Hall. It is a mostly quiet and clean living environment that accommodates 76 people in suite-style housing.

Adams house is named for Elizabeth “Ibbie” F. Adams ’29, who was a Skidmore honors student, tennis champion and actor. After Skidmore she attended Yale, Cambridge, and the University of London for her graduate studies. During World War II she served as a truck and ambulance driver and social worker with refugees for Ann Morgans Unit in France. She received the Croix deGuerre for services rendered with the Front in 1940. Ms. Adams was also a 1942 graduate of Massachusetts' Women's Civilian Defense Corps as an Air Raid Warden and Fire Fighter.

Adams house is in charge of organizing and implementing the annual Halloween Haunted House for community children. This is a really fun event where groups of three or four transform Falstaff’s into a fright filled experience! Past themes have included a haunted schoolhouse and Heaven and Hell.

They have used their \$1,000 budget to get cable TV in their second floor lounge, have invite-your-professor-to-dinner nights, and T-shirt decorating.

floor leaders Floor leaders are unique to the Honors Floors. In addition to an RA and an HC, each floor has its own coordinator who, with help from residents, designs, organizes, and implements activities. This person is in charge of making sure that the floor spends its budget and the residents enjoy their living experience. Want to be a floor leader? First you need to apply to live on an Honors Floor. Once you live there, all you need to do is volunteer for the job!

The Honors Council is the faculty-administration-student governing body of the Honors Forum. 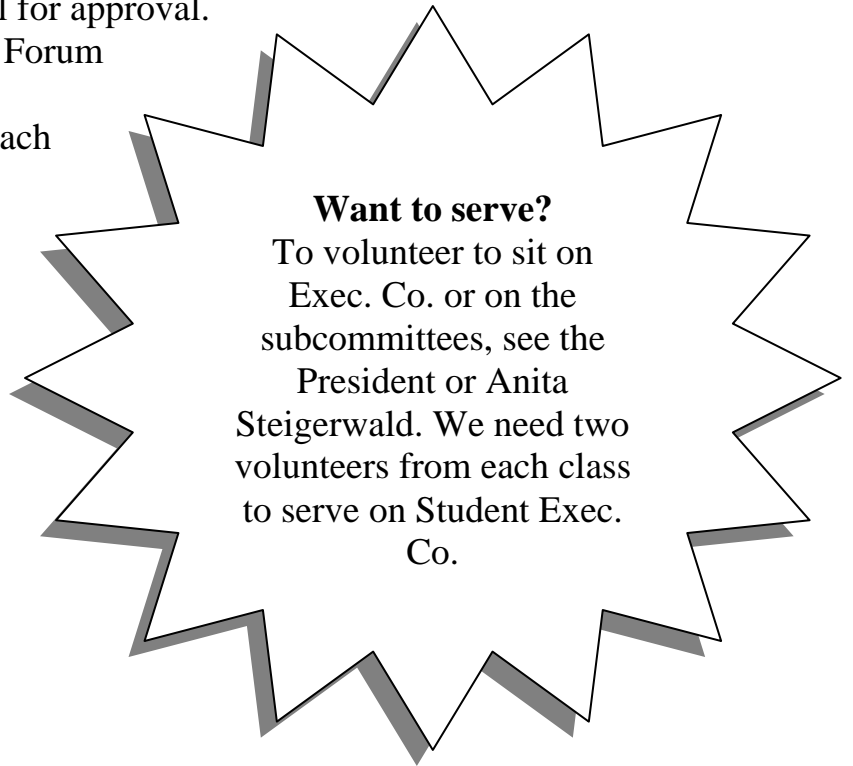

Frequently Asked Questions

If I'm not in Honors Forum, can I still graduate with honors and be a member of Periclean Honor Society and other honors groups?

Yes, Honors Forum membership is by application and student choice. All-college, departmental honors, membership in Periclean, Phi Beta Kappa, and other honors groups are separate from Honors Forum membership .

What do I receive with my Honors Forum membership?

Foremost, an intellectually enhanced college education and opportunities for academic and leadership growth. In terms of tangibles, members receive a coffee mug at induction. Seniors receive an Honors Forum medallion, which they wear at graduation, a certificate of achievement, and recognition of their membership in the Forum, which is listed on their transcript as an Honors Forum minor.

Are the Honors Floors only for Honors Forum students?

No. The Honors Floors are not associated with membership in the Honors Forum. Anyone with at least a 3.40 GPA can apply to live on the floor.

What happens if my GPA drops below a 3.4?

You will receive a warning from the Honors Forum Director if your GPA slips below 3.40 for one semester. After two consecutive semesters below 3.40, you will lose your Forum membership. Students who have lost their Honors Forum membership may reapply once both their semester and cum GPA reach 3.40.
