

Non-Returning Student Study – Survey Results & Transfer Institutions 2023

I. Methodology

- This study examined the attitudinal reasons students gave for voluntarily withdrawing from Skidmore College.
 Satisfaction levels related to areas of academic and social concern for their transfer institution and Skidmore were also assessed.
- Students who entered Skidmore at any time as a first-time, first-year student but voluntarily withdrew between Sept 1, 2021 and Aug 30, 2023 were contacted five times from November 2023 through January 2024 to complete the survey. Dismissed and academically disqualified students were excluded from this study.
- The overall response rate was 24% (299 former students contacted, 68 responded, and at least 18 were not contactable). The proportion of students of color responding was similar to the population; however, men were less likely to respond.

II. Reasons for Leaving

- Non-returning students were presented with a list of possible reasons for leaving Skidmore. The concerns of
 greatest importance in leaving were related to social areas and size (see Table IIa). Findings were somewhat
 similar to 2021. The largest changes were personal/family difficulties decreased in importance in 2023 but
 social concerns about marijuana/drug-related activities and lack of social options on campus that are
 alternatives to downtown increased in importance as reasons for leaving.
- Comparisons based on select demographic/identity variables were considered (see Table IIa for complete findings).
 - Non-returning women were less likely than men to report perceiving Skidmore's location as isolated and the student body size as small as reasons; however, women were more likely than men to report personal/family reasons, illness, financial difficulty, and the transition to residential living as reasons.
 - Students of color were more likely than white students to report that lack of diversity in the student body, difficulty interacting with students/faculty unlike me, or a bias/discrimination incident were reasons for leaving. Students of color were also more likely than white students to report social life's focus on alcohol/marijuana/drug-related activities as reasons.
 - Students receiving Skidmore need-based grant aid were more likely than those not receiving such aid to indicate that financial difficulties prompted leaving.
 - Students with high AQR scores were more likely to report their greater academic motivation compared to other students as a reason for leaving. High AQR students were less likely to cite many social issues as reasons for leaving including not fitting in and cliques making it difficult to form friendships.
- Former students were asked if their reason(s) for leaving Skidmore were related to experiences based on their identity (e.g., race or ethnicity, gender identity or expression, etc.). Some former students reported these were major or minor reasons (see Table IIb) with 15% reporting experiences related to their socioeconomic status as a major reason and 9% reporting experiences related to their race/ethnicity as a major reason. Students of color were more likely than white students to report experiences as a result of their race/ethnicity as a reason for leaving.
 - Former students were also asked a related open-ended question: "You indicated an <u>aspect of your identity</u> was a reason for leaving Skidmore. If you are able to, please share more about your experience(s)." Responses included:
 - Student population is incredibly privileged/wealthy
 - Not belonging/imposter/the other/left out because of race and cliques
 - Microaggressions/implicit or explicit racism, transphobia, sexism, etc.
 - Social life too focused on drugs/alcohol

III. Satisfaction with Skidmore & Transfer Institution

- To further clarify the reasons for leaving, former students were asked if their Skidmore experience was worse than, the same as, or better than their transfer institution experience in several areas. There are some concerns when asking such questions including the difference in terms of age and most having a first-year/sophomore experience at Skidmore and a junior/senior experience at a transfer institution. The findings appear to reaffirm the importance and the expectations that former students place on certain college experiences.
- For the areas where Skidmore did best, nearly one-third of former students indicated that Skidmore was "better" in terms of student-faculty interaction in and outside of the classroom and faculty advising/mentoring (see Table IIIa). Approximately two-thirds said Skidmore was "worse" than their transfer institution concerning co-curricular offerings, social life, school spirit, diversity, geographic location, and sense of community.
 - Former students were also asked the open-ended question "What exactly <u>drew you</u> to your <u>transfer</u> college/university?"
 - The most frequent responses included:
 - Academics (rigor/reputation/more challenging/higher ranked)
 - Financial (lower cost/in-state tuition/scholarship)
 - Size (student body and/or institution larger)
 - More major or minor options/Has desired major
 - Closer to home/family
 - Location (larger city/more urban)
 - Additional responses were:
 - Social environment (better social opportunities or community)
 - More extracurricular activities
 - More supportive atmosphere/Listens to students/There for students
 - Better school spirit
 - Variety of/more course options
 - Internships/Co-op/Employment opportunities
 - Peers more academically motivated/driven
 - Fewer cliques/Peers more friendly or nicer
 - Alcohol or drugs less prominent
 - Sports/athletic opportunities

IV. Academic Interests, Choice, & Clearinghouse Data

• Ninety-one percent (91%) of respondents indicated transferring to another institution after leaving Skidmore. Institutions attended by survey respondents included a mix of universities and colleges (See Table IVa).

- The National Student Clearinghouse provides a more complete picture of the U.S. institutions to which Skidmore non-returning students transferred (See Table IVb). Sixty-five percent (65%) of non-returning students were matched to Clearinghouse data.
- Forty-seven percent (47%) of former Skidmore students attended private 4-year institutions, 41% attended public 4-year institutions, and 13% attended public 2-year institutions. Compared to the prior report, the percentage of students transferring to another private 4-year institution decreased (from 61% to 47%) while the percentage choosing a public 4-year institution increased (from 31% to 41%).
- States enrolling the greatest share of former students during this timeframe were NY (34%), MA (11%), CA (5%), PA (5%), and CT (4%). NJ, FL, IL, NC, CO, and NH each had 3%.
- Compared to prior findings, this is a very diverse group of transfer institutions. While larger and urban
 institutions are still present and New York State schools are well represented, a greater number of SUNY
 institutions and community colleges are represented.

- To gauge if some students consider Skidmore to be a stepping stone to transferring, former students were
 asked if "you expected to graduate from Skidmore" upon initial enrollment. Very few (12%) indicated that they
 did not expect to graduate from Skidmore. There is no discernable difference in AQR scores for those
 expecting to graduate upon entry and those not.
- Fifty-five percent (55%) of non-returning students reported that Skidmore was accurately represented to them during the recruitment and admissions process. This figure tends to vary greatly based on survey administration year and in recent years has been between 55% to 75%.
 - Former students who felt Skidmore was not portrayed accurately before entry responded to the question: "In what ways was Skidmore not accurately presented to you?" The top areas mentioned included:
 - Presented as inclusive and/or diverse and experience was otherwise
 - Social aspects worse than presented (from social programs/activities/clubs to social issues/environment)
 - · Living situation not accurately presented
- Former students were asked about their knowledge of how to access Health Services and the Counseling Center as well as their utilization of these services during their time at Skidmore. Ninety-one percent (91%) of non-returning students reported knowing how to access both and 68% said they utilized the services of one or both. These figures are similar to the last administration.

V. In Their Voice - Narrative Responses

- Former students were also asked to respond to a series of open-ended questions. A bulleted summary of their responses follows. Note that the same respondent may have mentioned similar themes in responding to each question.
- What did you <u>like most</u> about your time at Skidmore?
 - o The two most frequently cited areas were:
 - My friends/Relationships/Friendships
 - Instructors (accessible, approachable, etc.)
 - Other areas included:
 - My classes/Academics
 - Saratoga/Downtown/Location
 - Academic rigor/experiences
 - Athletics team
