Remarks Skidmore College's 101st Commencement May 19, 2012

With that Skidmore self confidence you have gained, you can "think big" and, in the words of Steve Jobs, "make a dent in the universe."

You will feel comfortable with change and welcome its consequences.

I remember so well the words of advice of Eleanor Roosevelt who visited the campus in my senior year. Skidmore would arrange for well known speakers to come to campus and not only address the entire student body but also engage the students in smaller lively group discussions in the evening.

During one such discussion in which I was privileged to participate. Mrs. Roosevelt said – and I paraphrase: "We live in perplexing and troubling times. You have your entire life ahead of you. With your education you have the tools to make a difference. Be confident you can make a difference and go do it."

Well, not much has changed. We, indeed still live in perplexing and troubling times. What was true then, is true now. That Skidmore education has given you the capability to make a difference and the self confidence to go do it.
