2. Moderated listserv (i.e., messages only transmitted after moderator approval)	Zero risk of violations to FERPA, HIPAA, etc.	Raises complex issues around moderation and censorship (including whose job it is!)
4. Multiple listservs, with limited options to opt-in or out (also perhaps option to receive digest)	Allows some ability to curate their email while ensuring some universal access	Moderate risk of violations to FERPA, HIPAA; narrows community present in discussion
5. Unmoderated single list (i.e., our practice prior to April 2020)	Robust access to discussion across campus constituencies	No curation ability; Highest risk of high-impact violations to FERPA, HIPAA; risk for comm harm
