Antinuous basis (for program enrollment): A calendar system classification that is used by institutions at enroll students at any time during the academic year. For example, a cosmetology school or a word becessing school might allow students to enroll and begin studies at various times, with no requirement
at classes begin on a certain date.
poperative education program: A program that provides for alternate class attendance and employment business, industry, or government.
or operative housing: College-owned, -operated, or -affiliated housing in which students share room and ard expenses and participate in household chores to reduce living expenses.
Counseling service: Activities designed to assist students in making plans and decisions related to their ucation, career, or personal development.
edit: Recognition of attendance or performance in an instructional activity (course or program) that can applied by a recipient toward the requirements for a degree, diploma, certificate, or other formal award.
edit course: A course that, if successfully completed, can be applied toward the number of courses quired for achieving a degree, diploma, certificate, or other formal award.
edit hour: A unit of measure representing an hour (50 minutes) of instruction over a 15-week period in a mester or trimester system or a 10-week period in a quarter system. It is applied toward the total number hours needed for completing the requirements of a degree, diploma, certificate, or other formal award.
oss-registration: A system whereby students enrolled at one institution may take courses at another titution without having to apply to the second institution.
ferred admission: The practice of permitting admitted students to postpone enrollment, usually for a riod of one academic term or one year.
gree: An award conferred by a college, university, or other postsecondary education institution as officia cognition for the successful completion of a program of studies.
gree-seeking students: Students enrolled in courses for credit who are recognized by the institution as eking a degree or formal award. At the undergraduate level, this is intended to include students enrolled vocational or occupational programs.
ffers by program (calendar system): A calendar system classification that is used by institutions that ve occupational/vocational programs of varying length. These schools may enroll students at specific nes depending on the program desired. For example, a school might offer a two-month program in nuary, March, May, September, and November; and a three-month program in January, April, and stober.
ploma: See Postsecondary award, certificate, or diploma.
stance learning: An option for earning course credit at off-campus locations via cable television, ernet, satellite classes, videotapes, correspondence courses, or other means.
ctor's degree-research/scholarship: A Ph.D. or other doctor's degree that requires advanced work yond the master's level, including the preparation and defense of a dissertation based on original search, or the planning and execution of an original project demonstrating substantial artistic or scholarly hievement. Some examples of this type of degree may include Ed.D., D.M.A., D.B.A., D.Sc., D.A., or M, and others, as designated by the awarding institution.
octor's degree-professional practice: A doctor's degree that is conferred upon completion of a program oviding the knowledge and skills for the recognition, credential, or license required for professional actice. The degree is awarded after a period of study such that the total time to the degree, including both e-professional and professional preparation, equals at least six full-time equivalent academic years. me of these degrees were formerly classified as "first-professional" and may include: Chiropractic (D.C. D.C.M.); Dentistry (D.D.S. or D.M.D.); Law (L.L.B. or J.D.); Medicine (M.D.); Optometry (O.D.); teopathic Medicine (D.O); Pharmacy (Pharm.D.); Podiatry (D.P.M., Pod.D., D.P.); or, Veterinary adicine (D.V.M.), and others, as designated by the awarding institution.
ctor's degree-other: A doctor's degree that does not meet the definition of a doctor's degree - search/scholarship or a doctor's degree - professional practice.
uble major: Program in which students may complete two undergraduate programs of study nultaneously.
rolled in high school. Students are not required to apply for admission to the college in order to rticipate.

participate. **Early action plan:** An admission plan that allows students to apply and be notified of an admission decision well in advance of the regular notification dates. If admitted, the candidate is not committed to enroll; the student may reply to the offer under the college's regular reply policy. Early admission: A policy under which students who have not completed high school are admitted and

enroll full time in college, usually after completion of their junior year.

Early decision plan: A	A plan that permits students to apply and be notified of an admission decision (and

Master's degree: An award that requires the successful completion of a program of study of generally one or two full-time equivalent academic years of work beyond the bachelor's degree. Some of these degrees, such as those in Theology (M.Div., M.H.L./Rav) that were formerly classified as "first-professional", may require more than two full-time equivalent academic years of work.

Minority affiliation (as admission factor): Special consideration in the admission process for members of designated racial/ethnic minority groups.

* **Minority student center:** Center with programs, activities, and/or services intended to enhance the college experience of students of color.

Model United Nations: A simulation activity focusing on conflict resolution, globalization, and diplomacy. Assuming roles as foreign ambassadors and "delegates," students conduct research, engage in debate, draft resolutions, and may participate in a national Model UN conference.

Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands.

Nonresident alien: A person who is not a citizen or national of the United States and who is in this country on a visa or temporary basis and does not have the right to remain indefinitely.

* On-campus day care: Licensed day care for students' children (usually age 3 and up); usually for a fee.

Open admission: Admission policy under which virtually all secondary school graduates or students with GED equivalency diplomas are admitted without regard to academic record, test scores, or other qualifications.

Other expenses (costs): Include average costs for clothing, laundry, entertainment, medical (if not a required fee), and furnishings.

Out-of-state tuition: The tuition charged by institutions to those students who do not meet the institution's or state's residency requirements.

Part-time student (undergraduate): A student enrolled for fewer than 12 credits per semester or quarter, or fewer than 24 contact hours a week each term.

* **Personal counseling**: One-on-one or group counseling with trained professionals for students who want to explore personal, educational, or vocational issues.

Post-baccalaureate certificate: An award that requires completion of an organized program of study requiring 18 credit hours beyond the bachelor's; designed for persons who have completed a baccalaureate degree but do not meet the requirements of academic degrees carrying the title of master.

Post-master's certificate: An award that requires completion of an organized program of study of 24 credit hours beyond the master's degree but does not meet the requirements of academic degrees at the doctoral level.

Postsecondary award, certificate, or diploma: Includes the following three IPEDS definitions for postsecondary awards, certificates, and diplomas of varying durations and credit/contact hour requirements—

Less Than 1 Academic Year: Requires completion of an organized program of study at the postsecondary level (below the baccalaureate degree) in less than 1 academic year (2 semesters or 3 quarters) or in less than 900 contact hours by a student enrolled full-time.

At Least 1 But Less Than 2 Academic Years: Requires completion of an organized program of study at the postsecondary level (below the baccalaureate degree) in at least 1 but less than 2 full-time equivalent academic years, or designed for completion in at least 30 but less than 60 credit hours, or in at least 900 but less than 1,800 contact hours.

At Least 2 But Less Than 4 Academic Years: Requires completion of an organized program of study at the postsecondary level (below the baccalaureate degree) in at least 2 but less than 4 full-time equivalent academic years, or designed for completion in at least 60 but less than 120 credit hours, or in at least 1,800 but less than 3,600 contact hours.

Private institution: An educational institution controlled by a private individual(s) or by a nongovernmental agency, usually supported primarily by other than public funds, and operated by other than publicly elected or appointed officials.

Private for-profit institution: A private institution in which the individual(s) or agency in control receives compensation, other than wages, rent, or other expenses for the assumption of risk.

Private nonprofit institution: A private institution in which the individual(s) or agency in control receives no compensation, other than wages, rent, or other expenses for the assumption of risk. These include both independent nonprofit schools and those affiliated with a religious organization.

Proprietary institution: See Private for-profit institution.

Public institution: An educational institution whose programs and activities are operated by publicly elected or appointed school officials, and which is supported primarily by public funds.

Quarter calendar system: A calendar system in which the academic year consists of three sessions called quarters of about 12 weeks each. The range may be from 10 to 15 weeks. There may be an additional quarter in the summer.

Race/ethnicity: Category used to describe groups to which individuals belong, identify with, or belong in the eyes of the community. The categories do not denote scientific definitions of anthropological origins. A person may be counted in only one group.

Race/ethnicity unknown: Category used to classify students or employees whose race/ethnicity is not known and whom institutions are unable to place in one of the specified racial/ethnic categories.

Religious affiliation/commitment (as admission factor): Special consideration given in the admission
process for affiliation with a certain church or faith/religion, commitment to a religious vocation, or
observance of certain religious tenets/lifestyle.
* Religious counseling: One-on-one or group counseling with trained professionals for students who wan
to explore religious problems or issues.
* Remedial services: Instructional courses designed for students deficient in the general competencies
necessary for a regular postsecondary curriculum and educational setting.
Required fees: Fixed sum charged to students for items not covered by tuition and required of such a large
proportion of all students that the student who does NOT pay is the exception. Do not include application fees or optional fees such as lab fees or parking fees.
Resident alien or other eligible non-citizen: A person who is not a citizen or national of the United State
and who has been admitted as a legal immigrant for the purpose of obtaining permanent resident alien
status (and who holds either an alien registration card [Form I-551 or I-151], a Temporary Resident Card
[Form I-688], or an Arrival-Departure Record [Form I-94] with a notation that conveys legal immigrant
status, such as Section 207 Refugee, Section 208 Asylee, Conditional Entrant Parolee or Cuban-Haitian).
Room and board (charges)—on campus: Assume double occupancy in institutional housing and 19
meals per week (or maximum meal plan).
Secondary school record (as admission factor): Information maintained by the secondary school that
may include such things as the student's high school transcript, class rank, GPA, and teacher and
counselor recommendations.
Semester calendar system: A calendar system that consists of two semesters during the academic year
with about 16 weeks for each semester of instruction. There may be an additional summer session.
Outside and device and maximum A maximum of study beauty and an individual interaction devices of (2000) (2000)
Student-designed major: A program of study based on individual interests, designed with the assistance
of an adviser. Study abroad: Any arrangement by which a student completes part of the college program studying in
another country. Can be at a campus abroad or through a cooperative agreement with some other U.S.
college or an institution of another country.
^s Summer session: A summer session is shorter than a regular semester and not considered part of the
academic year. It is not the third term of an institution operating on a trimester system or the fourth term of
an institution operating on a quarter calendar system. The institution may have 2 or more sessions
occurring in the summer months. Some schools, such as vocational and beauty schools, have year-round
classes with no separate summer session.
Talent/ability (as admission factor): Special consideration given to students with demonstrated
talent/abilities in areas of interest to the institution (e.g., sports, the arts, languages, etc.).
Teacher certification program: Program designed to prepare students to meet the requirements for
certification as teachers in elementary, middle/junior high, and secondary schools.
Transfer applicant: An individual who has fulfilled the institution's requirements to be considered for
admission (including payment or waiving of the application fee, if any) and who has previously attended
another college or university and earned college-level credit.
Transfer student: A student entering the institution for the first time but known to have previously attende
a postsecondary institution at the same level (e.g., undergraduate). The student may transfer with or witho
credit. Transportation (conta): Accurace two record trice to studentic homotours non-voor for students in institution
Transportation (costs): Assume two round trips to student's hometown per year for students in institution beweing or delive travel to and from your institution for commuter students.
housing or daily travel to and from your institution for commuter students. Trimester calendar system: An academic year consisting of 3 terms of about 15 weeks each.
Tuition: Amount of money charged to students for instructional services. Tuition may be charged per term
per course, or per credit.
* Tutoring: May range from one-on-one tutoring in specific subjects to tutoring in an area such as math,
reading, or writing. Most tutors are college students; at some colleges, they are specially trained and
certified.
Unit: a standard of measurement representing hours of academic instruction (e.g., semester credit, quarte
credit, contact hour).
Undergraduate: A student enrolled in a four- or five-year bachelor's degree program, an associate degree
program, or a vocational or technical program below the baccalaureate.
Veteran's counseling: Helps veterans and their dependents obtain benefits for their selected program
and provides certifications to the Veteran's Administration. May also provide personal counseling on the
ransition from the military to a civilian life.
Visually impaired: Any person whose sight loss is not correctable and is sufficiently severe as to
adversely affect educational performance.
Volunteer work (as admission factor): Special consideration given to students for activity done on a
volunteer basis (e.g., tutoring, hospital care, working with the elderly or disabled) as a service to the
community or the public in general.
Wait list: List of students who meet the admission requirements but will only be offered a place in the clas
if space becomes available.
Weekend college: A program that allows students to take a complete course of study and attend classes
only on weekends.

White: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle Eas	t, or North Africa.
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* Women's center: Center with programs, academic activities, and/or services intended to promote an understanding of the evolving roles of women.

Work experience (as admission factor): Special consideration given to students who have been employed prior to application, whether for relevance to major, demonstration of employment-related skills, or as explanation of student's academic and extracurricular record.

Financial Aid Definitions

Awarded aid: The dollar amounts offered to financial aid applicants.

External scholarships and grants: Scholarships and grants received from outside (private) sources that students bring with them (e.g., Kiwanis, National Merit scholarships). The institution may process paperwork to receive the dollars, but it has no role in determining the recipient or the dollar amount awarded.

Financial aid applicant: Any applicant who submits **any one of** the institutionally required financial aid applications/forms, such as the FAFSA.

Indebtedness: Aggregate dollar amount borrowed through any loan program (federal, state, subsidized, unsubsidized, private, etc.; excluding parent loans) while the student was enrolled at an institution. Student loans co-signed by a parent are assumed to be the responsibility of the student and **should** be included.

Institutional scholarships and grants: Endowed scholarships, annual gifts and tuition funded grants for which the institution determines the recipient.

which the institution determines the recipient.
Financial need: As determined by your institution using the federal methodology and/or your institution's
own standards.
Need-based aid : College-funded or college-administered award from institutional, state, federal, or other
sources for which a student must have financial need to qualify. This includes both institutional and
noninstitutional student aid (grants, jobs, and loans).
Need-based scholarship or grant aid: Scholarships and grants from institutional, state, federal, or other
sources for which a student must have financial need to qualify.
Need-based self-help aid : Loans and jobs from institutional, state, federal, or other sources for which a student must demonstrate financial need to qualify.
Non-need-based scholarship or grant aid: Scholarships and grants, gifts, or merit-based aid from
institutional, state, federal, or other sources (including unrestricted funds or gifts and endowment income)
awarded solely on the basis of academic achievement, merit, or any other non-need-based reason. When
reporting questions H1 and H2, non-need-based aid that is used to meet need should be counted as need-
based aid.

student need not demonstrate financial need to qualify.
Private student loans: A nonfederal loan made by a lender such as a bank, credit union or private lender

Private student loans: A nonfederal loan made by a lender such as a bank, credit union or private lender used to pay for up to the annual cost of education, less any financial aid received.

Work study and employment: Federal and state work study aid, and any employment packaged by your institution in financial aid awards.
